GOVERNMENT AFFAIRS

2023 PRE-SESSION POLICY CONFERENCE

Prior to the 2023 legislative session, NMF&LB members participated in the pre-session policy conference. During the conference, members were provided updates by the State Land Office, New Mexico Livestock Board, Office of the State Engineer, and the New Mexico Department of Agriculture. CropLife America provided the participants with training on advocacy and messaging and staff provided a briefing on the legislative landscape. The pre-session policy conference serves as a great tool to increase engagement during the legislative session while preparing our members to advocate.

2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION

The 2023 legislative session started on January 17, and with over 3.6 billion dollars of new money available legislators had a huge opportunity to make some major investments and changes surrounding state policy.

2023 LEGISLATIVE SESSION CONT.

Over the course of the session 1294 bills, resolutions, and memorials were filed. NMF&LB worked diligently to advance our priorities while developing coalitions and partnerships to kill bills that would be detrimental to our producers and the sector. Major accomplishments are listed helow.

AGFEST

AgFest serves as a platform to increase advocacy and allow participants the ability to connect, build relationships, and have critical conversations. We had over 40 agricultural booths, a strong bi-partisan legislative presence, and excellent support from executive agencies.

We were able to utilize partnerships with our state's higher education institutions. specifically Central New Mexico University and New Mexico State University, as both their culinary programs were highlighted in our chef stations. Additionally, we were finally able to achieve a long-time goal of serving NM beer and wine at the event while highlighting in-state production and supporting small businesses and the valueadded sector.

GRASSROOTS ADVOCACY IN ACTION

Farm Bill

In June, NMF&LB President Larry Reagan, Vice President Travis Harris, board members Jamie Viramontes, Jereon Van der Ploeg, and Women's Leadership Committee (WLC) member Carlina Harris all participated in a federal fly-in with our congressional delegation specifically targeted at the farm bill. Our members shared their stories and experiences with farm bill programs which they each utilize every day on their farms and ranches.

In partnership with various agricultural organizations across the state, we also launched an op-ed campaign to bring awareness to the farm bill and garner support. Those op-eds were picked up in numerous statewide publications.

August Recess

Congressman Gabe Vasquez from NM's Second Congressional District visited NMF&LB's Vice President and WLC member Travis and Carlina Harris at their farm and ranch in San Antonio where they discussed water issues. Congressman Vasquez also toured Don and Cheryl Hartman's farm in Deming where they discussed labor, healthcare, and specialty crop insurance. Russell Johnson also joined the visit to provide insight on the need for additional resources at the border and issues impacting our border communities.

Senator Heinrich paid David and Mary Lucero of De Baca County Farm & Bureau a visit to their orchard in Fort Sumner. David and Mary are new producers who have been strong proponents of soil health, agritourism, and regenerative practices.

August Recess Cont.

In addition to the farm visits, we also participated in two congressional roundtables during the August recess. The first roundtable was hosted by Senator Lujan and included Undersecretary for Agriculture Marketing and Regulatory Programs Jennifer Moffit. The group had the opportunity to discuss challenges and successes with programs under the jurisdiction of Undersecretary Moffitt. NMF&LB commented on our continued efforts to assist in the establishment of a state meat inspection program, challenges with grasshopper infestations, and the impacts the federal milk marketing hearing will have on NM's dairy producers.

- Number of trainings: 32

Sixty-five teachers and many community organizations participated in this event which included teacher workshops and school garden tours.

NM GROW PROJECT

The grant provides materials for a 4X8 raised bed with drip irrigation system, hoop system attachments, and classroom hydroponic system kit. Three workshops reaching 32 participants were held in Albuquerque. Tularosa, and Santa Fe for anyone interested and for grant recipients to pick up and learn how to use the supplies. Member Benefits

NMF&LB Day at the Isotopes

More than 8.000 people attended the game. and more than 500 NMF&LB swag items were given out. We displayed ag facts on the big screen at every home game this season, which will be viewed by more than 550,000 game attendees. Our geofencing campaign allowed us to target mobile devices within the area beginning on the day before the game and ending on the day after, and reached just under 30,000 people.

Trade Shows & Events

We sponsored the Great New Mexico Chile Taste-Off and hosted a booth with an interactive activity. We expected to reach 500 to 800 attendees. We also had a booth at the New Mexico Hay Conference. ORGANIZATION

Training for County Farm Bureaus

Field staff conducted statewide trainings for county Farm Bureau Board of Director members from June through August this year. Twenty-nine participants from 12 counties attended the trainings hosted by Taos, Socorro, Doña Ana, and Eddy. Trainings covered components from the Farm Bureau Builder Program: governance, planning, and membership recruitment. The purpose was to assist county Farm Bureaus with evaluating their strong and weak points and guide them to build a stronger county organization. Future training sessions will be scheduled to occur on an annual basis. A Council of Presidents was also hosted in September to provide additional training by AFBF staff to county Farm Bureau presidents and promote networking among the counties. Staff is also working to develop and distribute a handbook for county Farm Bureau board members and officers.

County Farm Bureau Activities

Field staff continued to support all counties in their grassroots efforts. Some highlights from the past year include:

- Torrance CF&LB hosted their 3rd Annual Tractor Parade and Safety Day in Estancia in June. Almost 20 tractors participated in the parade and vendors from across the county set up booths.
- Luna CF&LB served 140 burgers during their annual Burger Fry and Membership Drive during the Southwestern NM State Fair in Deming in October.
- Doña Ana CF&LB hosted their countywide membership drive in June. They set up tables at grocery stores across the county and handed out bags of pinto beans with a QR code to the NMF&LB website.







PROGRAMS

NMSU COLLEGIATE FARM BUREAU

NMSU Collegiate Farm Bureau members elected new officers during the spring semester and developed an annual plan for the group in late August. Three NMSU Collegiate Farm Bureau members attended a County Farm Bureau leadership workshop to gain a better understanding of the purpose and structure of Farm Bureau. Collegiate Farm Bureau members conducted member recruitment activities on the NMSU campus in conjunction with the College of ACES. The two program advisors and five students attended the FUSION conference in March.



YOUNG FARMERS AND RANCHERS

The committee started the year strong engaging legislators at AgFest and during a day spent at the Capitol. Following AgFest, a retreat was held where committee members and staff collaborated to establish a program of work to form goals for the upcoming year. Changes in fundraising and discussion meet were among the many topics of discussion. YF&R hosted a golf tournament on August 26th in Belen with teams from across the state participating. The committee plans on doing another tournament tentatively scheduled for July in Ruidoso. The committee is also working on increasing membership through a new membership program.


WOMEN'S LEADERSHIP PROGRAM


